The Cumberland County United Way Campaign Kicks Off



It's that time of year again!

IT'S TIME FOR THE 2011 CUMBERLAND COUNTY EMPLOYEE UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN. This year's campaign will run from Oct.24-Nov. 4, 2011. The United Way supports 25 local agencies that provide services that are essential to the well-being of our community. This includes the Dolly Parton Imagination Library Initiative which delivers monthly books to more than 3,000 children, including 300 military children, under the age of five each month.

"I want to express my support of the United Way and I hope you will join me in contributing to this year's campaign," said County Manager James Martin. "I encourage you to give to the United Way, as employee contributions comprise the majority of the funding that supports the United Way agencies."

Last year, Cumberland County employees donated over \$51,000 in support of United Way. The goal for this year's campaign is \$52,000.

"This is an attainable goal, if we all work together as a team as expressed through our 2011 United Way theme, 'Live United,'" said Martin.

The United Way Campaign is part of the Cumberland County Employees' Season of Sharing, the time of year when County employees are asked to donate time and money to charitable causes.

Robert Hines, president and CEO of the United Way of Cumberland County, said the County employees have helped the United Way touch many lives.

"I want to thank the Cumberland County employee family for their past support and also would like them to remember that no matter what amount they give, it makes a difference," said Hines. "In 2010 we touched over 159,000 lives because of Cumberland County employees."

Hines also pointed out that tough economic times have increased the needs of the United Way and the people it helps. And the funds raised help young people live productive lives, Hines said.

"The number of children going to the Boys and Girls Club has doubled," said Hines. "These are kids that are learning something productive and staying out of trouble by being in after-school programs."

Assistant Finance Director Wins in Senior Games

A CUMBERLAND COUNTY EMPLOYEE recently won at the state level of the North Carolina Senior Games. HOWARD ABNER, ASSISTANT FINANCE DIRECTOR, won the racquetball competition at the North Carolina Senior Games this summer.

Abner won at the local level of Senior Games, organized by the Mid-Carolina Council of Governments, to move up to the state level of competition. His victory aside, 64-year-old Abner said he competes in the games for sportsmanship and fellowship with other seniors.

"You see some of the same people," said Abner, an Air Force veteran. "Even in the championship game, it was someone I had played before."

Abner said the competition was fierce. He claimed his title after winning the best two out of three games of the racquetball championship tournament. He lost his first game, 14-15, but the scores were flipped in the next game, which he won 15-14. He sealed his championship with an 11-4 win in the third game.

"It was a lot of fun to participate," said Abner. "I would encourage anyone 55 or older to compete in the Mid-Carolina Senior Games."

Abner said he will not compete in the National Senior Games, which are held in alternate years. The next National Games won't be held until 2013.

Food Drive

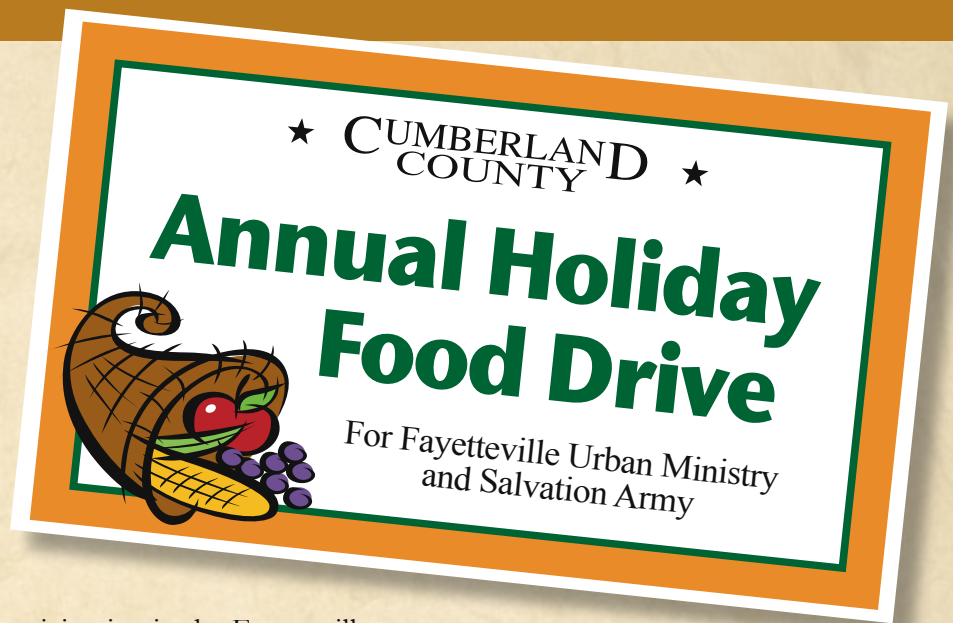
THIS YEAR CUMBERLAND COUNTY CONTINUES THE LONGSTANDING TRADITION of participating in the Fayetteville

Urban Ministry/Salvation Army Food Drive. This community service effort provides food to families in need during the Christmas holidays. Food collection boxes will be placed at various county buildings on Nov. 8. The boxes will be collected on Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 6-7, and delivered to the joint Fayetteville Urban Ministry and Salvation Army warehouse.

Please donate non-perishable items in the designated plastic totes. Cans and plastic jars are a must. Please, no glass containers of any kind. Plastic jars of peanut butter, jellies and pasta sauces are especially welcome, as are canned meats, vegetables and fruits and sturdy bags or boxes of rice, pasta, dried beans and grits.

Last year, more than 700 families were helped, and this year the agencies have a lot more people applying for food. Janice Voter, coordinator of emergency services for the Fayetteville Urban Ministry, said an estimated 28,000 pounds of food was collected in last year's food drive. She said Cumberland County employees contributed a large amount to the collection.

"This is a big endeavor and you have to have community support for it to be successful," said Voter. "This wouldn't be possible without support and Cumberland County government is a big part of that support."

Planning Department Has a Heart

THE CUMBERLAND COUNTY PLANNING DEPARTMENT led the way in the Sandhills Heart Walk, with a total of \$5,311.97 raised for the American Heart Association.

The 2011 Sandhills Heart Walk was held Oct. 8 in Fayetteville. Money raised by the walk goes toward the American Heart Association's efforts to fight cardiovascular diseases and stroke. Annie Melvin, a GIS Tech II is the captain of Team Planning & Inspections. Melvin said she is proud of her team and the money they have raised for heart health.

"I'm very proud of my team. I know they got tired of me bugging them to death about money," said Melvin. "I'm very proud of the way people pitched in and just supported us."

Dozens of Cumberland County employees participated in the Sandhills Heart Walk, and many others made donations although they did not take part in the walk. A total of \$18,272 was raised by Cumberland County employees. The Department of Social Services raised \$4,051.30, the second highest department total. Twenty-one Cumberland County departments had teams in the Sandhills Heart Walk.

Court System Employee Helps Raise Awareness of Domestic Violence and Animal Cruelty

A CUMBERLAND COUNTY FAMILY COURT EMPLOYEE has found a unique way to tackle a serious subject – domestic violence. KELSIE DURRENCE, A FAMILY COURT CASE COORDINATOR, helped organize the Howl-O-Ween pet costume contest to bring awareness to the problem of domestic violence and to raise money for the county’s Injured Animal Stabilization Fund.

“October was Domestic Violence Awareness Month and we usually do things for Safe Havens Supervised Visitation Center,” said Durrence. “I just had the idea that animals were victims too.”

The Howl-O-Ween contest was held Saturday, Oct. 8, at Fayetteville Technical Community College. The event raised \$2,248 and let pet owners gather in a fun setting. Durrence said she hopes, as a result of Howl-O-Ween, that more people will take notice of possible domestic violence if they see animals abused in a home.

“A lot of people don’t realize there is such a big connection, even with children,” said Durrence. “A lot of times if you see an animal being abused, there is probably other abuse going on in the home.”

Durrence brought her own costumed canine to Howl-O-Ween. Her miniature dachshund, named Buggie, sported a banana split costume.

“He just kind of sat there like, ‘Really?’” said Durrence.

The job fair attracted 99 vendors and approximately 3,100 job seekers. The next Fall Into Work Job Fair will be held in October 2012.

“Our vendors appeared very pleased with the turnout and felt that there were many qualified individuals in attendance,” said Robert Relyea, employment resources coordinator for the Work First Program.

“We have identified several hundred positions that should be filled as a result but this information came from only 14 vendor survey responses,” Relyea said. “Based on this small sample we feel the event was pretty successful and should lead to a lot more hiring as we enter the holiday seasons.”

Relyea also had praise for the Crown Coliseum Staff for expert support for vendors and the public in attendance.

A Fall Festival will be held at the Cumberland County DSS building at 1225 Ramsey Street on Thursday, Nov. 10, from 6 to 8 p.m.

An interview with a DSS adoption recruiter will air as part of the department’s DisPatch Show on Community Channel 7.

An adoption Saturday will be held at the Fascinate-U Children’s Museum on Saturday, Nov. 19, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

“Adoption Awareness month is a time to promote positive perceptions about the adoption experience and debunk myths in the hopes that we can unite many of these young people with forever families,” said Sandra Robinson, foster care and adoption recruiter. “Celebrations and observances will also serve to express gratitude to the many caring families that have already adopted and encourage others to come forward and recognize the need to provide permanent homes for children.”

Anyone interested in becoming a foster or adoptive parent is invited to attend a foster care/adoption informational session. The sessions are held on the third Thursday of each month at noon or 6:30 p.m. on the first floor of the DSS building.

“There is an increase in the number of children coming into foster care and, of course, foster care leads to adoption, which is permanent,” said Robinson. “We are just asking members of our community who have the time and patience and love to share to come to some of our events and learn more about the needs of the children in the community.”

Cumberland County Community Development Notice of Funding Urgent Repair Program



CUMBERLAND COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT (CCCD) has been awarded funding from the NC Housing Finance Agency (NCHFA) under the 2011 cycle of the Urgent Repair Program (URP11). This program provides funds to income eligible households with special needs in addressing housing conditions which pose imminent threats to their life and /or safety, or to provide accessibility modifications.

To qualify individuals (1) must reside within Cumberland County but outside the city limits of Fayetteville; (2) own and occupy the home in need of repair; (3) meet income requirements indicated in the table below; and 4) must be identified as a special needs household.

Form of Assistance/Amount of Grant:

Assistance to homeowners will be in the form of a forgivable loan. The loan amount will depend on the scope of work necessary to address the identified urgent repair(s) up to a maximum of \$6,000.

Applications will be accepted on a first-come first-served basis until December 31, 2012 (based on funding availability).

Cold Weather Means Storm Preparedness, Fire Safety

WITH SNOW STORMS COVERING the Northeast in two feet of snow, it's not too early to prepare for winter storms in Cumberland County.

Cumberland County Emergency Management Officer Gene Booth is reminding citizens to observe fire safety and winter weather preparedness.

"Homeowners need to check smoke detectors monthly and change the batteries with the daylight savings time change," Booth said. Smoke detector maintenance is an important part of fire prevention, but it's far from the only safety action you can take. Booth says families need to have a fire evacuation plan and rehearse the plan, especially with children. Having a plan ahead of time can mean the difference between life and death in a real house fire.

With the weather turning cooler, November is also a time to be aware of fire safety in home heating, which includes awareness of deadly gases like carbon monoxide.

"If you use some type of fuel-burning method of heating, whether it is LP gas, wood or natural gas, be sure you have a carbon monoxide monitor in your home," Booth said.

Space heaters are not designed to be a primary heating source. Turn them off when you leave a room. Also remember never to smoke in bed and never to run electrical cords under rugs, piles of clothes or furniture.

James Johnson: Combat Chaplain: A 30-Year Vietnam Battle Tuesday, November 8 at 7:00 p.m. Headquarters Library

In conjunction with Fayetteville's "Heroes Homecoming," U.S. Army (retired) Lt. Col. James Johnson Ph.D. speaks about his experiences as a combat chaplain and his books: *Combat Trauma: A Personal Look at Long Term Consequences*, and *Combat Chaplain: A Thirty Year Vietnam Battle*, the latter of which describes his Vietnam War experience, and the aftermath of dealing with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

As a chaplain, Johnson went unarmed into battle to offer his ministry to the troops. "You've never really lived until you've almost died," he says.

Johnson has trained Reserve and National Guard chaplains on how to emotionally survive the horrors of combat. He also trained inexperienced chaplains in the 82nd Airborne Division in preparation for going into battle and ministering to the needs of soldiers in combat.

His military awards include Bronze Stars for Valor and Service, the Air Medal (for combat), Meritorious Service medals, and Army Commendation medals.

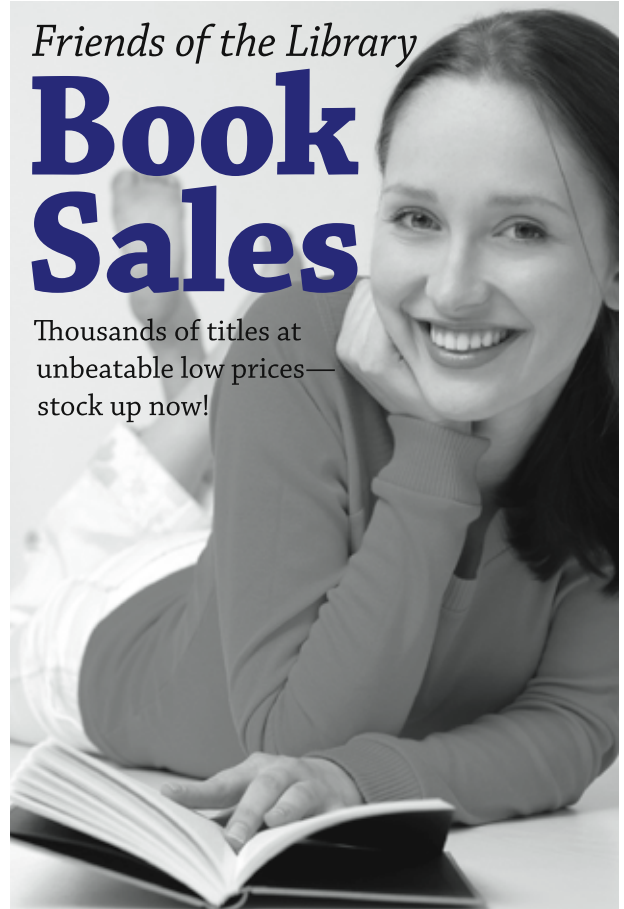
An Albemarle native, Johnson graduated from Wake Forest University, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and earned a Doctorate in Marriage from Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. He completed Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth Kansas and has served in many counseling capacities, including Minister of Counseling at Snyder Memorial Church from 1990 until 2005.
