Chairman Marshall Faircloth called the meeting to order.

INVOCATION

Commissioner Keefe called on Imam Adam Beyah who provided the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag.

Recognition of Second Missionary Baptist Church Youth Organization

Commissioner Charles Evans stated the youth and Cultural Arts Ministry of Second Missionary Baptist Church worked collaboratively with Mrs. Nancy Evans-Gaddy, the Youth Writing Project coordinator, to publish a book titled We are God's Children, God Is Love. Commissioner Evans stated Mrs. Evans-Gaddy was inspired by her love for children and her belief that children are speaking to everyone. Commissioner Evans stated when Mrs. Evans-Gaddy shared her vision for this writing project, her hope was that the children's book would give readers an incentive to think about God's love and what it means. RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Adopt the following resolution:

The Cumberland County Board of Commissioners finds:

The real property located at 600 and 620 Ames Street, Fayetteville, (the sheltered workshop site) will not be needed for government purposes for the term proposed for the lease of the property to Employment Source, Inc.;

The Board adopted a resolution of intent to lease the property described herein at its regular meeting held February 6, 2012; and

The notice of intent to lease the property was advertised in the Fayetteville Observer on February 10, 2012.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the chairman is authorized to execute a lease to Employment Source, Inc., a non-profit corporation, for that property consisting of approximately 12.96 acres described as Tract 1, PB 111 p. 69, located at 600 and 620 Ames Street, Fayetteville, NC, for a term of not more than 10 years commencing April 1, 2012, to be terminated upon two years notice, and at an annual rental rate of One Dollar (\$1).

C. Approval of Report of North Carolina Department of Transportation Notification

BACKGROUND:

According to correspondence from Tracy M. Clark, NCDOT Division 6 Right of Way Agent, seven (7) known graves will be disinterred from a cemetery located in Cumberland County, TIP/Parcel No. R-2303A 157. E. Approval of Declaration of Surplus Property and Approval of Sale of County-Owned Real Property Acquired by Tax Foreclosure: PT Tract 164 Simmons Heights 500 x 180 – PIN: 0428-55-0724; Cross Creek Township

BACKGROUND:

On or about June 1, 1981, the County acquired by tax foreclosure PT Tract 164 Simmons Heights 500 x 180 – PIN: 0428-55-0724; Cross Creek Township. The amount currently owed on the foreclosure judgment including interest and costs for the property is \$1,886.45.

Chris Manning has offered to purchase the property for \$1,886.45 and has deposited \$188.65 in the Finance Office. The tax value of the property is \$8,520.00.

This property has not been declared surplus to the needs of the County. If it is so declared, according to N.C.G.S. §153A-176 and N.C.G.S. §105-376, the County has the authority to sell such property. Management has reviewed this offer and it is now being submitted for the Board to consider whether or not to accept Mr. Manning's bid. The property has been advertised and this office has not received any upset bids. The bid period is now closed.

AFFIDAVIT OF THE HOUSING INSPECTOR'S REPORT BEFORE THE BOARD OF CUMBERLAND COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

I, George Hatcher, Inspector for the County of Cumberland Inspection Department, acting in my official capacity, being duly sworn, depose and say:

BACKGROUND: That the following is a report on Minimum Housing case number MH 6529-2011.

Property Owner: Isia Johnson, Willie D. Crumpler, & Gina Hogan Home Owner: Isia Johnson, Willie D. Crumpler, & Gina Hogan

Property Address: 8238 NC Highway 210 S., Autryville, NC

Tax Parcel Identification Number: 1403-29-7383

SYNOPSIS: This property was inspected on 6/8/2011. The property owners and parties of interest were legally served with Notice of Violations and were afforded a Hearing on 7/28/2011. Isia Johnson attended the Hearing. It was ordered that the structure be repaired to a minimum standard for human habitation, or be demolished and the debris removed from the premises by a date not later than 10/28/2011. The property owners and parties of interest were notified of the appeal procedures when they were served with the Findings of Fact and Order. No appeal was filed. Upon my visit to the property on 11/7/2011, no corrective action had been made to the structure. The structure is presently vacant and unsecured. In its present state, the structure constitutes a fire, health, and safety hazard.

The estimated cost to repair the structure to a minimum standard for human habitation is \$\$40,514.00. The Assessor for Cumberland County has the structure presently valued at \$\$2,762.00.

This case is returning before the Board pursuant to the Minutes of the November 21, 2011 Board of Commissioners Meeting granting a 90 day continuance.

This is the duly advertised/noticed public hearing set for this date and time. Chairman Faircloth opened the public hearing.

The Clerk to the Board advised there were no speakers.

Chairman Faircloth closed the public hearing.

MOTION: Commissioner Edge moved to adopt the order and report of the Minimum Housing

Inspector as the true facts in this case, and to order the property owner to remove or demolish the dwelling within 30 days, to order the Inspector to remove or demolish the dwelling, if the owner fails to do so and impose a lien on the real property for the cost of such action; and to direct the clerk to incorporate the foregoing findings and orders in an ordinance certified by the Chairman and record the same in the Register of Deeds.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

DISCUSSION: Commissioner King asked if the property had once been a school. Mr. Hatcher stated the property was the Lonely Hill School in the 1930's and was converted to a residence in the 1950's. Mr. Hatcher stated over the last three to four years the property has deteriorated. Mr. Hatcher stated he had received a letter from Isia Carter and the family. Commissioner Evans asked whether the family sought assistance from Community Development. Mr. Moorefield advised he had given Ms. Carter the address information but did not know whether she made contact.

4. Presentation of I-95 Corridor Planning and Finance Study by Mr. Roberto Canales, Coordinator of Strategic Initiatives for the Secretary of Transportation

BACKGROUND:

Mr. Roberto Canales, Coordinator of Strategic Initiatives for Secretary of Transportation Eugene A. Conti, presented information on the I-95 Corridor Planning and Finance study, which is a blueprint for improvements to Interstate 95 in North Carolina. The study recommends widening the interstate to eight lanes from Exit 31 in Robeson County to the Interstate 40 interchange at Exit 81, and to six lanes for the remainder of the I-95 corridor. Tolling is the recommended funding option.

Throughout February, the N.C. Department of Transportation has scheduled a series of seven public hearings to gather public feedback on the study. The public is invited to attend the public hearing in Cumberland County from 4 to 7 p.m. on Monday, February 27 at the Double Tree Hotel at 1965 Cedar Creek Road.

RECOMMEDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Encourage citizens to attend the public hearing on the I-95 Corridor Study from 4 to 7 p.m. on Monday, February 27 at the Double Tree Hotel at 1965 Cedar Creek Road and to contact the Department of Transportation for more information.

Mr. Martin called on Roberto Canales who provided the following presentation of the I-95 Corridor Planning and Finance Study dated February 2012:

I-95 Background

- 1950s-1980s: I-95 built in NC
- 2003: Tolling feasibility study
- 2006: TIP Project I-4745
- 2009: I-95 Corridor Planning & Finance Study
- 2010: Tolling at the Borders study

Mr. Canales pointed out that the policy decision as whether or not to toll has not yet been made.

Mr. Canales stated the study has already identified the need to widen the interstate to eight lanes from Exit 31 in Robeson County to the Interstate 40 interchange at Exit 81, and to six lanes for the remainder of the I-95 corridor.

Mr. Canales displayed a map depicting Phases I and II of the improvements to Interstate 95 in North Carolina.

Mr. Canales advised North Carolina General Statutes require that any tolls collected have to be applied directly to the route that is tolled. Mr. Canales stated should North Carolina move forward, federal approval would have to be granted and a tolling agreement would have to be developed to spell out how the revenue will be used; the corridor would have to be defined and it could only be used on I-95.

Mr. Canales responded to questions. Commissioner Keefe asked whether studies had been conducted to identify the economic impact toll roads have on communities along I-95. Mr. Canales stated there are preliminary evaluations and there are issues associated with diversion lanes that shift traffic into local communities.

Commissioner Keefe read the following statement:

In response to the presentation by the NCDOT to initiate Toll Roads, Toll Booths and Prepaid tickets for the I-95 corridor strikes me as one of the greatest cases of short term thinking and not truly looking at the global picture of solutions to our economic crisis. I believe this is a very narrow perspective of how NCDOT may eliminate their fiscal burden of responsibility to maintain the highways without taking into consideration the unintended consequences. But the butterfly effect of these toll roads and booths to Cumberland County, its industry, and citizens will be felt everyday in the future and will be a constant reminder of why we cannot break out of the government "tar pit" of an increased financial burden created by government on the backs of our citizens and the industry that has chosen to put roots down in our area.

This initiative is just another short fix in a long line of government proposals that will placed on the backs of the working people and their families in Cumberland County and the State of North Carolina.

Cumberland County is the most populous county in North Carolina, on I-95, that will be affected by this decision. Its ability to attract economic development projects

in the future will seriously have a negative impact on our ability to recruit new business and industry to our area. Our greatest asset and selling tool is our close proximity to I-95. This toll road initiative would largely negate any advantage we have in the global market. It will not matter how good our schools are, how low our tax rate is, how vibrant our arts and culture programs are; Industry will ultimately make their decisions based on the costs of doing business. If every shipment moving down I-95 will have to pay the toll, if every worker has to pay a toll to come to work and every potential customer or visitor has to pay a toll to arrive to their destination in Cumberland County, we might as well "throw in the towel" on economic development, recruitment and tourism. Large manufacturing companies will recruit personnel from all over our region. If a worker has to commute to a company in Cumberland County from another county and that person has to use I-95 to get to work, it could easily cost that person up to \$100 extra per month or \$1200.00 a year just to get to work. This is a high cost to an economically depressed area and would surely be a consideration for any new industry with thoughts of locating here. I have heard my fellow commissioners speak many times of our commitment to bring good paying jobs to our area. I do not think any of us, envisioned that a large part of these salaries, would be going to the state to maintain the roads. Currently, North Carolinians pay one of the highest gas taxes in the nation to maintain our road systems. These tolls will be in addition to these funds. I have heard it said that this will largely be a "passing though," toll for people from other states who using I-95. Although I understand the argument, I am not sure I am comfortable, charging a family, who probably saved responsibly all year to take their kids to Disney World or Myrtle Beach, \$20.00 each way just to drive on our portion of I-95. Many of them will already be filling up their gas tanks in North Carolina, paying a Gas Tax, Eating in our restaurants, Sales tax + Food & Beverage tax, staying in our hotels, Sales Tax +Occupancy Tax, and stopping along the way to enjoy the scenic beauty of our state. I believe asking them to pay an additional fee for the privilege of using our road borders on greed. I do not wish that the unofficial motto of North Carolina, up and down the east coast to be, "North Carolina, Home of the \$20 toll." The reality of these toll roads is they will primarily be used and paid for by taxpayers of North Carolina.

Recently, we lost two major industries that could have brought in excess of 2,000 high paying jobs with solid benefits. We lost both of these, not because our location, but the potential industries made a decision that it would be more profitable for them to locate else because of infrastructure issues not addressed earlier in the state of North Carolina. I would ask anyone in the economic development field if toll roads would be an advantage or disadvantage to our area. The answer is clear. Frankly, I am surprised that every economic developer and state economic development agency has not vigorously opposed this initiative. It is not unforeseeable that counties may find ourselves having to subsidize or supplement potential industry the toll fees just to stay in the game of recruitment.

There is much concern from many members of community that many daily drivers or I-95 will navigate other roads to by pass the tolls. It doesn't take a Harvard

Mathematician to realize that this will cause increased traffic, enforcement and maintenance in our rural roadways and will cause a 'backslide" to an era before we were fortunate to have our I-295 beltline constructed. If I was in the financial position that some of these workers may find themselves in and the I had to make the decision to leave 5-10 minutes earlier, so I could save that extra \$100.00 per month for my family, there would be no question that I would do what so many people do every day, I would sacrifice my comfort and convenience for my family.

Furthermore, I have read that the funding generated by these tolls would help maintain I-95 and increase the lane capacity to up to 8 lanes in some places. I-95 is NOT where there needs to be increases in traffic lanes. If you were to travel across the state, you would clearly see that the traffic congestion on the interstate highway system is consolidated around the large highway systems and beltlines in Raleigh, Greensboro/Winston-Salem and Charlotte. I am sure that many members of the North Carolina legislature in areas not affected by this proposal will think it is a good additional source of revenue and will back the initiative. Of course, most of them will not see the direct impact of the toll roads to their counties and communities. It is not a stretch to see in the future that the revenue generated from these tolls in Robeson, Cumberland, Harnett, Sampson, Johnston County and the other counties on the corridor could be diverted to other projects in that NCDOT will be required to maintain and improve.

I find it curious that I-40 was not considered as a possible test case for the toll road program. Both are interstate road systems, NCDOT has responsibility to maintain this system also. Although I-40 is not as old as I-95, according to the life of a highway system, we may be looking at this same scenario in 10-15 years. If I were cynical, I may conclude that because I-40 runs from Wilmington, through Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill, Greensboro, Asheville, and north of Charlotte that our NCDOT may not have had the political fortitude to be able to pass this through some of those communities without heavy push back.

I understand that this project is being presented that the revenue will be initially dedicated to I-95, but, over time, funds in all forms of government rarely are used for their initial intended purpose and many times get appropriated by savvy politicians and bean counters. One must only look back at the state lottery and its initial intentions and its current use.

I would encourage all commissioners in counties on the I-95 corridor to take a hard look at the benefits and consequences of toll roads going through their respective communities.

In closing, I have spoken at length about the negative impact that toll roads on I-95 will have on communities, the industry and the citizens who rely on this artery to get to work everyday to support their families. The other side of the financial burden to these people is the fact that we will be implementing another massive government agency and authority that will surely increase in size.

This is not intended to be any sort of partisan position, I was elected to represent the citizens of our county and do whatever I can to protect them, their families and their jobs while being fiscally responsible...with compassion to their quality of life. I will continue do my elected duty to ensure that they are able to enjoy the fruits of their labor and not allow the government to unfairly and recklessly impose additional taxes and fees on them.

These comments only represent my opinion as one county commissioner and do not necessarily reflect the opinions of the entire board.

Mr. Canales responded to additional questions.

Commissioner Evans asked to go on record in support of Commissioner Keefe's statement.

Consensus of the Board was to accept the report as information.

5. Presentation of the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Report by Ms. Sarah Hallock and Mike Strickland

Chairman Faircloth called on Sarah Hallock, Director of Cumberland County CommuniCare, Inc., and Michael W. Strickland, Chief Court Counselor for the Twelfth Judicial District. Ms. Hallock stated CommuniCare, Inc. is a local non-profit organization that was developed over twelve years ago in partnership with the County of Cumberland. Ms. Hallock stated the CommuniCare, Inc.'s purpose is to develop quality driven prevention and intervention services for at-risk and court involved youth to create local alternatives to juvenile court. Ms. Hallock also stated CommuniCare, Inc. has built a successful relationship with the County of Cumberland based upon its program structure as well as the staff's abilities to provide superior project management in a myriad of areas including project and program development, oversight, financial planning/management and evidence-based monitoring and evaluation activities. Ms. Hallock stated since its incorporation, CommuniCare, Inc. has developed and implemented programs for youth ages six through seventeen in the following areas: juvenile justice and delinquency prevention / early intervention, child abuse prevention, drug and alcohol abuse prevention and out-patient treatment, youth leadership development, youth gang violence prevention/intervention, family strengthening and community collaboration/development. Ms. Hallock stated as a directive from the County Manager's office, CommuniCare, Inc. provides service coordination for the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC).

Ms. Hallock stated members of the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council are appointed by the Board of Commissioners and make recommendations to the Board so it can plan for the juvenile justice needs in Cumberland County. Ms. Hallock described the reputation the JCPC has earned across the state. Ms. Hallock reviewed the JCPC's duties and the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's (DJJDP) comprehensive strategies aimed at providing the right programs for the right youth at the right time.

Mr. Strickland presented data regarding charges by defense class for juveniles between the ages of six and fifteen for a total of 2,067 charges, which is made up of 1,975 delinquent charges and 92 undisciplined charges. Mr. Strickland stated the rate per thousand for delinquent charges in Cumberland County is 44.4%, which is above the state average of 27.73%. Mr. Strickland stated the

rate per thousand for undisciplined charges in Cumberland County is 1.72%, which is below the state average of 2.7%.

Mr. Strickland provided a breakdown of juvenile detention facility admissions for FY 2010-2011 and explained the reasons juveniles are going to detention. Mr. Strickland shared the following trend for Detention Center admissions from Cumberland County:

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517 admissions in 2008-2009 (Cost to Cumberland County- $466,089.00)
484 admissions in 2009-2010 (Cost to Cumberland County- $366,680.00)
374 admissions in 2010-2011 (Cost to the County- $496,054.00)
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Mr. Strickland stated there was a decrease in the Youth Development Center (YDC) commitment numbers. Mr. Strickland reported the 2010 annual report reflected 32 commitments from Cumberland Count but in FY 11, 28 youth were confined to the YDC. Mr. Strickland stated Cumberland County still sends more youth on average compared to all other counties.

Ms. Hallock stated JCPC works closely with the Department of Social Services, juvenile court, law enforcement and others to work with youth on the front end to keep them from incurring juvenile probation and other court sanctions. Ms. Hallock presented JCPC admissions by referral source for FY 2010-2011 and stated the majority of local juvenile crime is related to person and property crimes. Ms. Hallock stated each JCPC program includes interpersonal skill building into each intervention plan to redirect negative behaviors and hold them accountable for their actions and behaviors. Ms. Hallock stated 79.25% of the youth participating in JCPC programs achieve at least satisfactory and successful outcomes. Ms. Hallock reported of the youth that terminated the JCPC programs in FY 2010-2011 there was a success rate of 59% without new petitions which is a good recidivism rate compared to most community programs. Ms. Hallock stated JCPC is working to follow these youth at least one year after their program involvement to make sure they are not recidivating. Ms. Hallock shared cost data and stated JCPC works very hard to be cost effective and fiscally conservative, with most of the funding going to direct services.

Ms. Hallock and Mr. Stickland responded to questions. Consensus of the Board was to accept the report.
