B. Approval of Report on Delinquent Real Property Taxes for the Year 2014 and Direct the Tax Collector to Advertise the Tax Liens During the Month of April 2015

BACKGROUND:

North Carolina General Statute 105-369 requires the Tax Collector to report unpaid taxes for the current fiscal year that are liens on real property by the first Monday in February. The purpose of the reporting is to allow the Board of Commissioners to order the Tax Collector to advertise the tax liens. Upon receipt of the order, the tax liens will be advertised by posting notice at the County Courthouse and by publishing each lien at least one time in one or more of the newspapers having general circulation in Cumberland County.

The statute requires that advertisement period to occur during the period of March 1st through June 30th. The intention is to deliver an updated list of delinquent taxes to the newspaper in the latter part of April for advertisement in early to mid-May. The current delinquent report will be on display in the Clerk's office through February 2, 2015 in CD or printout format. After this date, the report will be available in the Tax Administrator's office.

BACKGROUND:

The County acquired both of the following real properties below at tax foreclosure sale in in 2012 for a total purchase price of \$5,075.78:

PIN 0454-43-6052; located at 4110 River Point Dr., Fayetteville, NC; being Lot 19, River Point, Plat Book 88, Page 4. Based on the County GIS Mapping system, it appears to be a vacant residential lot with a tax value of \$17,500.

PIN 0454-42-6788; located at 4118 River Point Dr., Fayetteville, NC; being Lot 20, River Point, Plat Book 88, Page 47. The tax records list a 1998 14x80 mobile home with a value of \$11,493 located on the lot as personal property of the previous owner of the parcel. The residential lot has a tax value of \$7,549.

Jackson Estates, LLC, has made an offer to purchase these lots for a total of \$6,000. If the Board proposes to accept this offer, the proposed sale must be advertised subject to the upset bid process pursuant to G. S. § 160A-269.

If the Board proposes to accept this offer, the proposed sale must be advertised subject to the upset bid process pursuant to G. S. § 160A-269.

- G. Approval of NCDOT Request for the Donation of Right of Way and Construction Easement for Tom Starling Road

BACKGROUND:

The North Carolina Department of Transportation is making improvements to Tom Starling Road for a distance of 3.4 miles from U.S. 301 to N.C. 87 (TIP Project W-5512). The improvements include grading, drainage, paving, signing, traffic control and pavement marking. NCDOT has requested that the county donate a right-of-way and a temporary construction easement for this project.

The right-of-way, designated as TIP Parcel Number W-5512.013, consists of an irregularly shaped parcel approximately 333 feet in length with a width varying from 99 to 76 feet and consisting of approximately 0.6 acres. It is located on a vacant 50.86 acre parcel that is part of the Cumberland Industrial Center, directly across Tom Starling Road from its intersection with Grandford Road. The requested right-of-way will become part of Tom Starling Road.

The temporary construction easement, designated as TIP Parcel Number W-5512.016, consists of a strip approximately 375 feet in length with a width varying from 26 to 34 feet located adjacent to the existing right-of-way of Tom Starling Road on vacant Lot 6B in the Cumberland Industrial Center. This lot lies between Tom Starling Road and the property of Le Bleu Corporation and is adjacent to the property of McCune Technology, Inc. The temporary easement will be extinguished when the project is completed.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

County attorney recommends the Board consider the request and if the Board proposes to donate the requested properties, resolve to authorize the Chair to sign the deeds and acknowledgement of donation.

H. Approval of Extension of Continuance of Stay of the Order for the Demolition of the Dwelling at 7846 Amesbury Road, Fayetteville

BACKGROUND:

Upon the county attorney's recommendation, at its meeting on December 1, 2014, the Board granted Mr. Herrera another stay of the order of demolition of the dwelling located at 7846 Amesbury Road to February 2, 2015 subject to conditions. The county attorney has confirmed that Mr. Herrera has complied with the conditions set by the Board and that DENR still has not rendered permit decision.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The county attorney recommends the Board grant another stay of the demolition order until April 6, 2015 subject to the continuing conditions as follows:

- (1) the grass be kept to a height of no more than 4 inches;
- (2) all shrubbery be appropriately trimmed:
- (3) the exterior surfaces of the structure be kept clean and free of mold or mildew;
- (4) the lawn be kept clear of all trash, debris and stored items;
- (5) the dwelling shall remain uninhabited.

The county attorney will make a further recommendation on April 6, 2015 based on the circumstances at that time.

2.F. Approval of Lease of Fisher Container Site for Solid Waste Convenience Center

BACKGROUND:

Solid Waste Department requests to renew the lease for the Fisher Container Site for a five year term on the same terms as the existing lease which will expire March 25, 2015. 2014. The rent is \$3,750 payable in full at the beginning of the lease term.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The county attorney recommends approval.

Commissioner Adams asked that the lease agreement be amended to include the lease term of five (5) years under Section III of the lease agreement to clarify that the rental amount of \$3,750 is for the five (5) years.

ITEMS OF BUSINESS

3. Presentation from the Air Quality Stakeholders Committee Regarding New EPA Ground-Level Ozone Standards in 2015, Implications for Cumberland County and Future Emissions Reduction Priorities

BACKGROUND:

Cumberland County voluntarily entered into the Early Action Compact in 2002. The Early Action Plan (EAP) was developed for Cumberland County and the Air Quality Stakeholders Committee was formed. This committee is supported by the Combined Air Team (CombAT) with membership from the Cumberland County Air Team, the Fort Bragg Air Team, and the Sustainable Sandhills Air Team. Based on the EAP, subsequent EPA milestones on ozone emission level reductions were achieved until Ozone Attainment standards were met in April 2008. To maintain attainment status, the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners approved participation in the Ozone Advance program in 2012. Every municipality within Cumberland County has signed a resolution in support of participation in the Ozone Advance program as of June 2013.

The EPA is issuing new Ozone Advance standards beginning 2015. The new proposed standards will set attainment between 0.065 parts per million (ppm) to 0.070 ppms. Cumberland County's design value for the past three years (2011-2013) was 0.069 ppm. If the new National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) is set at 0.070 ppm we will be in compliance, but if the EPA decides to take our values from 2013-2015 and sets the National standard at 0.065 ppm Cumberland County will not be in compliance. If 2015 is a low ground level ozone year like 2014 and the community continues working together to lower emissions as we have since 2002, then we look likely to meet the EPA proposed standards for this year. Emissions standards for ground level ozone will continue to decline over the next decade. Cumberland County must work together to be prepared.

Hanah Ehrenreich, Sustainable Sandhills Executive Director, appeared representing the Air Quality Stakeholders and presented the background information as recorded above. Ms. Ehrenreich stated new air quality standards have been anticipated for about three years and the EPA is issuing new Ozone Advance standards beginning September, 2015. Ms. Ehrenreich stated if Cumberland County falls out of attainment, there are voluntary and involuntary repercussions supervised by the state and the county could be facing across the board sanctions. Ms. Ehrenreich stated the Air Quality Stakeholders are presenting this information to make the Board of Commissioners aware that omission levels will need to be proactively addressed in the future. Ms. Ehrenreich responded to questions and explained should the county fall out of attainment, the new standards would not permit the county time to come back into attainment until such time as it came into compliance and got its omissions under control. Ms. Ehrenreich stated the EPA is seriously contemplating moving the omission standards downward to 0.060 ppm which the county would have to work to achieve.

4. Consideration of Approval of a Resolution Opposing the Proposed Interbasin Transfer ("IBT") Certificate Modification for the Towns of Apex, Cary and Morrisville, and Wake County (for RTP South) Alternative 2A – Increase IBT to Meet 2045 Demands

BACKGROUND:

Apex, Cary, Morrisville and Wake County have requested a change in their current interbasin transfer (IBT) certificate, which enables the movement of surface water from one river basin to another. The Triangle communities are seeking permission from the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources to take more water from the Haw River basin, which feeds into the Cape Fear River, and return it through wastewater to the Neuse River and Cape Fear River basins.

The communities are seeking more water to better accommodate projected growth and greater demands for water in the decades to come and prefer the option of returning the wastewater to the Neuse River (Alternative 2A).

Mick Noland, the chief operations officer of the City of Fayetteville Public Works Commission's Water Resources Department, will discuss why this IBT is unnecessary and poses increased risks to the water supply of Cumberland County and other counties downstream. The resolution as recorded below opposes the change in the IBT certificate under alternative 2A and recommends using alternative 3A, as described in the Environmental Assessment for the proposed IBT. This

option avoids interbasin transfer by sending additional untreated wastewater to the Western Wake Regional Water Reclamation Facility. The Western Wake Partnership has the infrastructure in place to allow the return of treated wastewater to the Cape Fear River. If wastewater is returned, an additional IBT would not be needed and existing conditions in the Cape Fear River would be preserved.

DENR held two public hearings; the first in Apex on January 7, followed by one in Fayetteville on January 22. DENR is accepting comments through February 6. The N.C. Environmental Management Commission is set make a decision on the transfer request later this spring.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Approve the resolution opposing the IBT modification request as recorded below.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE PROPOSED INTERBASIN TRANSFER ("IBT")
CERTIFICATE MODIFICATION FOR THE TOWNS OF APEX, CARY AND
MORRISVILLE, AND WAKE COUNTY (FOR RTP SOUTH) ALTERNATIVE 2A
– INCREASE IBT TO MEET 2045 DEMANDS

WHEREAS, the County of Cumberland, North Carolina, believes the Interbasin Transfer ("IBT") Certificate request submitted by the towns of Apex, Cary and Morrisville, and Wake County (for RTP South) is unnecessary and poses increased risks to the water supply of Cumberland County and other counties downstream; and

WHEREAS, the Cape Fear River is a tremendous resource to our community, providing our major source of water supply as well as affording many recreational opportunities for our citizens, and it is our responsibility to maintain the highest level of certainty for our future water supply; and

WHEREAS, based on modeling results, it has been determined that the minimum flows from the Cape Fear River at Lillington and Fayetteville will be reduced significantly in the future, even with no increase in IBT, making it critical that treated wastewater be returned to the Cape Fear River Basin; and

WHEREAS, the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission has indicated concern that increased withdrawals from Jordan Lake could negatively impact fish populations in the Cape Fear River and therefore negatively impact the river's ecosystem; and

WHEREAS, current requests for water supply from Jordan Lake do not allow for any water to be held in reserve; which could limit the ability of the lake to meet all of its intended uses, including water supply and flow downstream; and

WHEREAS, the additional transfer will cause more than 50 percent of the water supply to be diverted away from the Jordan Lake drainage basin; which is not in compliance with N.C. Department of Environmental Resources (DENR) rules and could jeopardize replenishment of the lake; and

WHEREAS, a water use decision of this magnitude seems premature given that the Cape Fear River Water Supply Plan, being prepared by DENR to determine whether or not all water supply needs can be met throughout the entire Cape Fear River Basin, has not been finalized; and

WHEREAS, this transfer request is based on a 30-year planning period, which is excessive and would compromise our ability to meet changes due to regulations, statutes, customer demands, climate changes, and regional needs; and a shorter planning period of 15 years would be more prudent; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The County of Cumberland recommends utilization of alternative 3A, as described in the Environmental Assessment for the proposed IBT. This option avoids interbasin transfer by sending additional untreated wastewater to the Western Wake Regional Water Reclamation Facility. The Western Wake Partnership has the infrastructure in place to allow the return of treated wastewater to the Cape Fear River. If wastewater is returned, an additional IBT would not be needed and existing conditions in the Cape Fear River would be preserved.

PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CUMBERLAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, on this, the 2nd day of February, 2015; such meeting was held in compliance with the Open Meetings Act, at which meeting a quorum was present and voting.

Ms. Cannon stated Commissioner Adams is the liaison to the PWC and attended the January 22 public hearing. Commissioner Adams stated although the Triangle communities have the capability to remove water from the Cape Fear River, run it through a wastewater treatment plant and return it to the Cape Fear River, Cary has indicated it does not want to do so because of the cost. Commissioner Adams stated the return of untreated wastewater to the Cape Fear River poses increased risks to the water supply of Cumberland County and other counties downstream.

Mick Noland, Chief Operations Officer of the City of Fayetteville Public Works Commission's Water Resources Department, stated Cary, Apex and Mooresville are the applicants and are proposing to transfer an additional 9 million gallons of water a day out of the Cape Fear Basin/Jordan Lake and discharge it back into the Neuse Basin. Mr. Noland stated 2001 they were authorized an interbasin transfer and are presently discharging 24 million gallons per day. Mr. Noland stated one of the conditions of the 2001 authorization required them to invest \$300 million in conveyance and treatment systems to take 80% of their usage, treat it and return it to the Cape Fear River. Mr. Noland stated they decided and the state has agreed that they do not need to make use of the conveyance and treatment systems for the additional 9 million per day.

Mr. Noland also stated this transfer request is also based on a 30-year planning period when it would be more prudent for a water use decision of this magnitude to be based on a shorter planning period. Mr. Noland stated this transfer request appears to have been fast-tracked and although he petitioned the state for more time, comments are due by February 6 and the Environmental Management Commission is scheduled to make their decision in March. Mr. Noland stated he asked Ft. Bragg and Harnett County to comment on the issue and has also coordinated with the Wilmington area and provided a resolution template to Harnett, Bladen and New Hanover Counties.

MOTION: Commissioner Adams moved to approve the resolution opposing the Interbasin

Transfer.

SECOND: Commissioner Council VOTE: UNANIMOUS (7-0)

Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding the authenticity of the recommendations. Ms. Cannon stated the president of the FACVB and the chair of the board of directors made the recommendations, not the hotel/motel association. Commissioner Keefe stated nominations should be delayed pending clarification of proper procedures for nominations and the board of directors' appointee position. Commissioner Edge inquired regarding the FACVB's accountability and possible changes therein. Rick Moorefield, County Attorney, stated he would review the statutory framework and provide a memo about what is contemplated under the statute. Commissioner Adams stated he echoed concerns expressed about the board of directors' appointee position and oversight. Ms. Cannon stated she addressed these concerns with the CEO of the FACVB prior to receipt of his memo regarding the recommendations and appointee position.

MOTION: Commissioner Keefe moved to delay nominations for the vacancies on the

Fayetteville Area Convention and Visitors Bureau.

SECOND: Commissioner Faircloth VOTE: UNANIMOUS (7-0)
