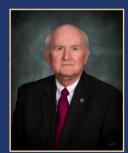

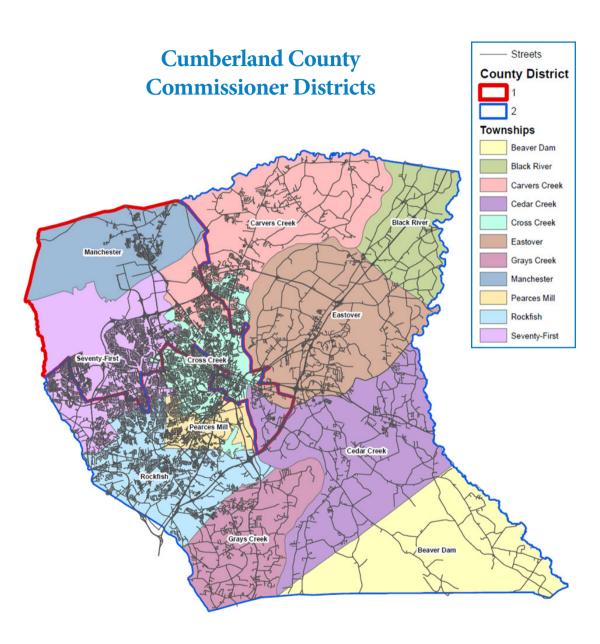

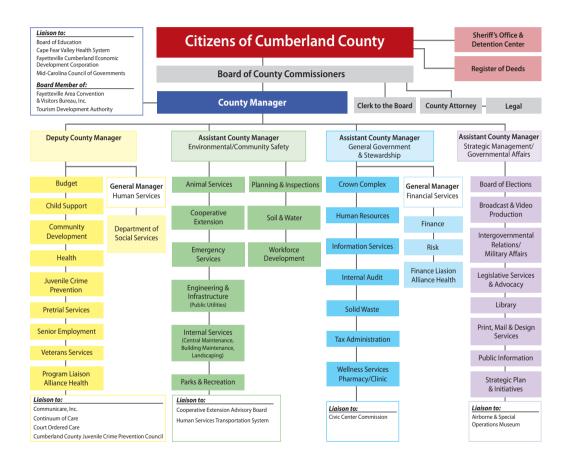

Government Overview

Cumberland County began as a settlement in the Upper Cape Fear Valley. It was formally established as a county in 1754, making it an extension of the state government. As a county in North Carolina, Cumberland County has significant responsibilities and mandates as determined by the state. Some of these responsibilities include Public Health, the Board of Elections, the Register of Deeds, and the Sheriff's Office. Beginning in the late 1960s, the North Carolina General Assembly introduced modifications to North Carolina law that placed more municipal responsibilities on counties in addition to their existing state service functions.

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Budget Highlights

The total annual budget for Fiscal Year 2020-2021 provides \$475,433,704 in total annual expenditures across all annual funds. The General Fund, the County's main operating fund, represents \$328,298,132 of this total. The property tax rate to support the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget remains constant at 79.9 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

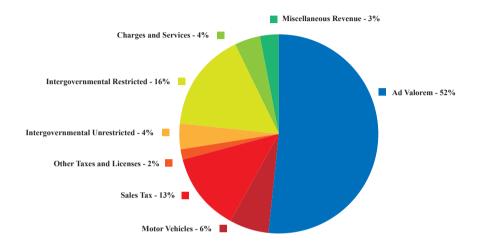
Major considerations of the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget include:

- Accounting for expected revenue shortfalls due to COVID-19
- Adjusting county fees to cover the cost of providing services
- Focusing on recruitment and retention with specific attention to high turnover classifications
- Reviewing and streamlining fleet management operations
- Collaborating with Durham, Johnston, and Wake Counties to provide consistent services to clients with significant mental health and intellectual/developmental disabilities
- Continuing community funding to outside agencies at Fiscal Year 2020 levels

Major Revenue Sources

Ad Valorem (Property) Taxes

Property taxes make up the largest source of revenue for the county at 52% of all General Fund revenue. Cumberland County's tax rate remains at 79.9 cents for every \$100 of property tax valuation. Property values are expected to increase by less than 1% compared to fiscal year 2019-2020. Revenue from ad valorem collections is projected to be flat, with a slight increase of 0.2% compared to fiscal year 2019-2020.

Motor Vehicles

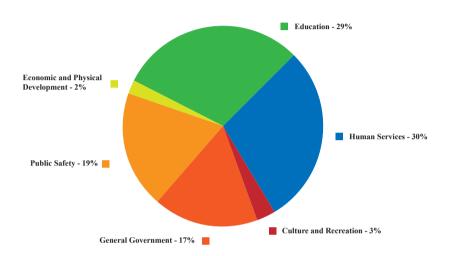
Motor vehicle taxes are collected by the North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) through the Tax and Tag Together program, providing citizens a convenient way to pay annual vehicle tag renewals and property taxes in one transaction. From FY2020 to FY2021 there was a slight 0.2% decline in this revenue source, but motor vehicle taxes have grown from just over \$16 million in FY2015 to a projected \$19 million in FY2021.

Sales Tax

Sales tax represents a combination of state and county tax percentages. The state charges 4.75% and Cumberland County charges 2.25%, bringing the total sales tax charge in Cumberland County to 7%. Sales tax revenue is projected at over \$41 million in FY2021, with a 4.1% decline compared to FY2020 due to the current economic slowdown.

Expenditures

General Government

The General Government category includes core functions of county government such as Administration, Human Resources, Tax Administration, Information Services, Register of Deeds, Central Maintenance, Landscaping and Grounds and Finance.

Public Safety

The Public Safety category includes the Sheriff's Office, Detention Center, Emergency Services, Youth Diversion and Animal Control.

Economic and Physical Development

The Economic and Physical Development category includes departments such as Planning, Engineering, NC Cooperative Extension, Public Utilities, Water and Sewer, and Soil Conservation

Human Services

The Human Services category includes departments such as Public Health, Veterans Services, Sobriety Court, Department of Social Services, and Child Support.

Education

The Education category includes the public school system's current expenses, Fayetteville Technical Community College (FTCC) and other education expenses.

Cultural and Recreation - Other

The Cultural and Recreation - Other category includes the Public Libraries, Stadium Maintenance, Airborne Special Operations Museum Foundation, Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County, Boys and Girls Club, Cape Fear Botanical Garden, Cape Fear River Assembly, Child Advocacy Center and the Vision Resource Center.
